

BACKGROUND

- □ The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has allocated \$1,075,489,884 in Community Development Block Grant Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) funds to support the Virgin Islands recovery from 2017 Hurricanes Irma and Maria.
- □ VIHFA, grantee, administers these funds.
- November 11, 2023, the Public Finance Authority/Virgin Islands Office of Disaster Recovery (VIODR) via subrecipient amendment No. SA-DR(PFA/ODR)-001-2024 provides Programmatic Management and project oversight of CDBG-DR Projects.

CDBG-DR FUNDS

\$1,075,489,884 HUD Allocation

Funds can be used for five (5) categories of activities that <u>directly</u> respond to impacts from **Hurricanes Irma & Maria**.

Housing

Public Services & Special Needs Housing

Infrastructure

Economic Revitalization

Planning & Grant Administration



SUBSTANTIAL AMENDMENT REQUIRED...

>3% of the total disaster recovery allocations or change in designated beneficiaries.

The 5th Substantial Amendment highlights the following three (3) factors:

- □ Project removal/deletions, consolidation of and the reallocation of funding.
 - Add additional funding to housing projects to address increased cost of construction, specifically PAHD and NHIC programs.
 - Consolidation of projects: Housing and Infrastructure
- ☐ Addressing the remaining unmet needs for the programs.
- ☐ The ability to expend funds within the remaining time allotted for the US Virgin Islands CDBG-DR grant cycle, *September 2026*.



HOUSING











HOUSING

Allocation increased \$29,017,977 for housing programs in this Amendment:

- ☐ Increased cost of construction due to shipping, material and labor.
- □ Construction of up to twenty (20) single and multi-family homes including construction and/or rehabilitation of public housing.
- ☐ Initiative enhances homeownership opportunities for LMI increasing inventory and affordability.



Consolidation of housing projects (PAHD & NHIC) providing funding to address flexibility by the Subrecipient.



PROGRAM BENEFITS

LMI benefits remains at 70%, based on community need; two (2) programs will be extending benefits to households between 81 and 120% of Area Median Income (AMI).

- □ New Housing Infrastructure Construction (NHIC) Program:
 - Option 1- remains at 80% AMI;
 - Option 2 extends to 120% AMI (Own a Lot-Build A Home Program)
- ☐ EnVIsion Homeowner Repair and Reconstruction Program

PUBLIC SERVICE & SPECIAL NEEDS HOUSING

Special Needs Housing focuses on repairs/replacements of damaged facilities that provide services to "at risk" populations -i.e., children, the elderly, homeless persons, persons with disabilities, and victims of domestic violence.

\$19,537,821 is allocated and committed to eligible projects for Special Needs Housing. \$1,473,798 has been allocated for Public Services.

Funding provides:

☐ Service to "at risk" populations to assist with recovery from the impacts of Hurricanes Irma and Maria.

Supplemental support to territorial agencies that will directly accelerate the speed of recovery.

*Projects: Supportive Needs Housing (SNH) seven (7) and three (3) for Public Services.



INFRASTRUCTURE









INFRASTRUCTURE (CONT'D)

- Allocation
 - Increase of \$1.58M for the Infrastructure Repair and Resilience.
 - Decrease of \$30.4M from Electrical Power Systems Enhancements and Improvements

Projects:

- ☐ Virgin Islands(VI)Waste Management Authority
 - Convenience Centers & Transfer Station
 - Anguilla Landfill Phased Closure
- **□** VI Water and Power Authority
 - Randolph Harley New Generation
 - Slope Stabilization
- Office of the Lieutenant Governor
 - Street Addressing Initiative

^{*} Consolidation of convenience center projects providing funding to address flexibility by the Subrecipient.



NON-FEDERAL COST SHARE

(Cost Share: FEMA 90% | Local (HUD) 10%)

- Designed to assist state agencies, public entities, local non-profit organizations, and other eligible applicants by leveraging CDBG-DR funds with FEMA Public Assistance (FEMA PA) provided to the Virgin Islands to maximize, facilitate and ensure recovery.
- □ DR funds are limited to covering the non-federal cost share match portion related to FEMA PA eligible project worksheets (PWs).







ECONOMIC REVITALIZATION

- ☐ Funding for Economic Revitalization Program decreased with the removal of the Port Dredging Project (Charlotte Amalie Harbor).
- □ Neighborhood Revitalization Program funding remains the same, funding for:
 - Grants and technical assistance to small businesses and microenterprises.
 - Grants to improve facades, landscaping and amenities in commercial areas.









PLANNING & ADMINISTRATION


There was **no change** to the allocation for planning activities. **\$3,500,000** of Planning Funds will be utilized for the Water and Power Authority Slope Stabilization project. SAI Project.

Investigation and design of water tanks slope geotechnical properties, et al; stabilize vertical hillside to maintain connection of the water distribution system and preventing catastrophic flooding.

☐ The administrative allocation remains at the maximum 5% of the total grant.



ENGAGEMENT SCHEDULE




